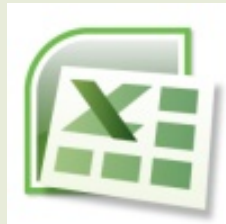

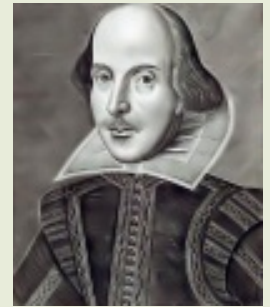

Shakespeare & the Uses of Imagination with Judson Scruton

On four consecutive Thursdays, from 1:30 to 3 pm, lecturer Judson Scruton will explore the theme of imagination in Shakespeare's major dramatic genres. Looking closely at selected scenes in text and film, Mr. Scruton will discuss *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, *Henry IV*, *Hamlet*, and *The Tempest*.

How does Shakespeare use the idea of poetic and dramatic imagination in comedy, history, tragedy, and romance? How have some contemporary films of these plays responded to Shakespeare's metaphoric leaps? How do we respond to these poetic and dramatic imaginings?



Judson Scruton has taught year-long university courses on Shakespeare and his works and has led study/travel programs to Shakespeare's Globe Theatre and the Royal Shakespeare Company. Our four lectures are presented at no charge, but donations will be welcome!

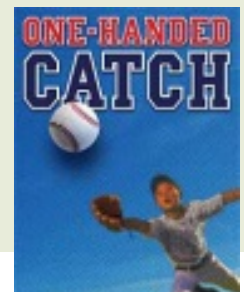

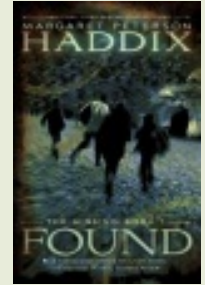

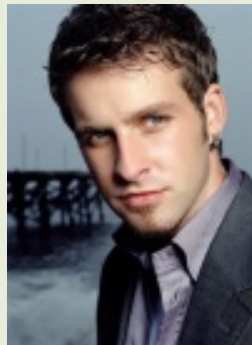


**Have Your Cake and Read It, Too!

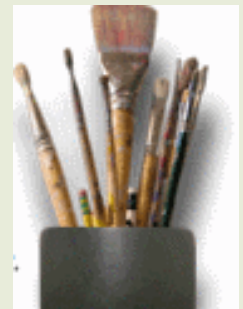
Opening Art Reception for Yenoin Guibbory Sunday, March 7th, 11:30 am to 1 pm

New Perspectives Documentary Series: *Full Battle Rattle*

Wednesday March 31st, 7 to 8:30 pm



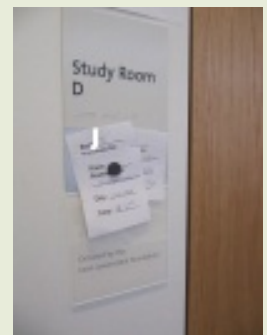
The third film on our New Perspectives Documentary Film Series is *Full Battle Rattle*, produced and directed by Tony Gerber and Jesse Moss, the story about a real war and a fake town. In California's Mojave Desert, the US Army has built a 'virtual' Iraq - a billion dollar urban warfare simulation - and populated it with hundreds of Iraqi role-players. Army units spend three weeks inside the simulation before deploying to Iraq.

The story is told from both sides of the conflict. Despite the movie-set contrivances, the stakes are high and the emotions are very real. As reality and fantasy overlap, the film moves from comic to surreal to poignant. A.O. Scott of *The New York Times* wrote, "*Like many of its predecessors, Full Battle Rattle takes no overt side in any arguments about the cause and course of the war. Instead the film emphasizes the strangeness and complexity of the conflict.*"

Following the film, join Tony Gerber and Jesse Moss for a Q&A moderated by Megan Smith-Harris, a local documentary filmmaker. There is no charge for the screening, but donations will be gratefully accepted. **Advance registration is recommended.**

New Charge for Study Room Use To Start in March For Commercial Users Only

Our six study rooms have become increasingly popular as folks learn about them and our reservation system. In order to continue to provide fair and balanced use to the community and to generate a small amount of revenue for Library operations, we will in March institute a fee for use of the rooms for commercial purposes. All paid tutors, interviewers, or consultants who derive economic benefit from the activity conducted in our study rooms will be asked to pay \$10 per session (3 hours or less) or to buy a 25-use card for \$225 (allowing a \$1 discount per
