*April is the cruellest month, breeding  
Lilacs out of the dead land, mixing  
Memory and desire, stirring  
Dull roots with spring rain.*

So wrote T.S. Eliot at the outset of his epic poem, *The Waste Land*, perfectly capturing the mix of emotions with which we experience the progression of seasons from winter to spring. Poetry will be a special focus this month as we join the rest of our nation in celebrating its power to stir our "dull roots." Poet Paul Engle described his craft for *The New York Times* in 1957: *Poetry is ordinary language raised to the Nth power. Poetry is boned with ideas, nerved and blooded with emotions, all held together by the delicate, tough skin of words.* Carl Sandburg wrote, *Poetry is an echo, asking a shadow to dance.* John Keats thought, *Poetry should strike the reader as a wording of his own highest thoughts, and appear almost a remembrance.*

I urge you all to borrow a slim volume of poetry (or a huge tome, for that matter!) this month and browse its pages. Hop on the Internet to not only read poems, but also learn about their creators and the principles behind their creation.

I like [The Poetry Foundation](#) site, but there are thousands that feature classic and contemporary poetry. Attend a program about poetry - we'll have several for all ages in store during the month at the Library (see below). Most of all, take time to read, reflect upon, recite, and react to poetry. You might even try to write a bit, as poet Muriel Rukeyser suggests:

### **In Favor of Form in Poetry with Bill Ziegler Thursday, April 1st, 10:30 am to noon**

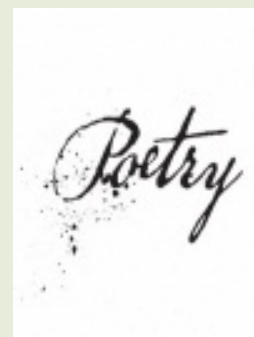

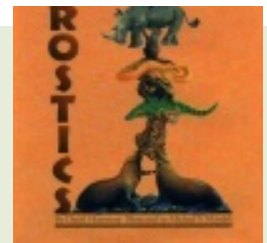


### **Animal Acrostics Workshop Thursday, April 8th, 4 to 4:45 pm**

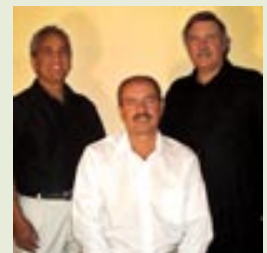

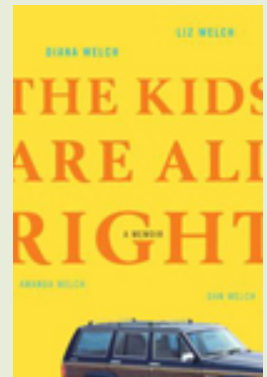
### **Author Talk: Liz Welch**

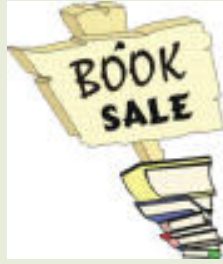

**Saturday, April 10th, 2 to 3 pm**

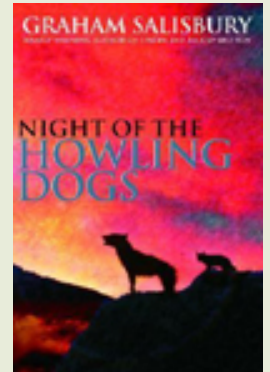

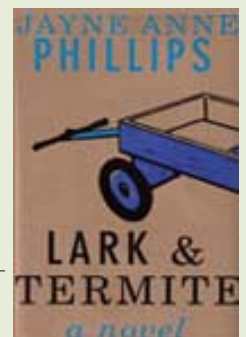

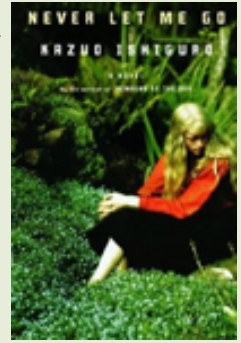
