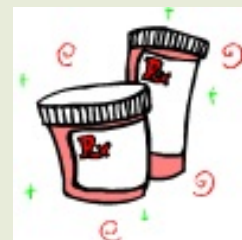

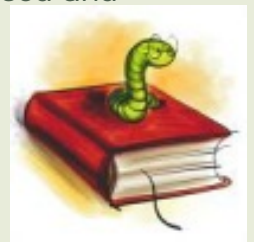

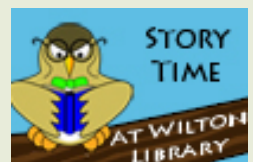

This story time is meant for independent listeners who are 4-6 years of age. Each session will provide children with experiences that enrich early literacy.

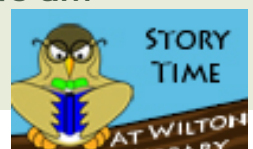


Wonderful Ones and Twos with Caregivers

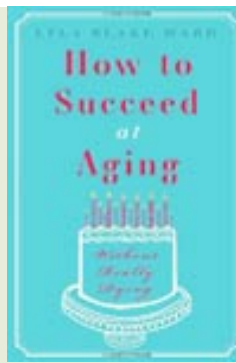

Wednesday, May 12th, 2 to 2:45 pm

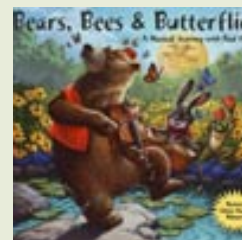
