



Hourly rates range from \$150 (Brubeck Room & Courtyard) to \$300 (Brubeck Room & Courtyard, Catering Kitchen and Gallery), with half-price rates for non-profit organizations. In addition, our two meeting rooms on the second floor and the craft/story room in the Children's Library are available for rent. (The Presidents' Room & Rimer Room rent for \$50/hour, and the craft/story room rents for \$80 an hour, with half-price rates for non-profit organizations.) Connecticut's Own: Larry Shiller and Olga Gurevich **Sunday, March 20th, 4-5 pm**



The Art of Photographing Your Garden




Monday, March 14th, 10:30-noon


Extended Health Care Solutions with John Baez CLTC (Genworth Financial)




**Dr. Richard Buel: *The Way of Duty*

Connecticut College in 2000 and received his Ph.D. in History from Yale University in 2009.



AARP Driver Safety Class

The AARP Driver Safety Program is a classroom course for drivers age 50 and older. This single session, 4-hour course covers the normal changes in vision, hearing and reaction time associated with aging and provides practical techniques on how to adjust to these changes, offering tips about how to operate vehicles more safely in today's increasingly challenging driving environment. There are no written or driving tests associated with this class as it will consist only of lecture and discussion. The class consists of both a morning (10 am-noon) and afternoon (1-3 pm) session and both sessions must be attended.

Art To Go: Day Trip to the Rubin Museum of Art in New York City

Wednesday, March 30th, 9:30 am-4 pm



An upcoming exhibition, *Masterworks: Jewels of the Collection*, will showcase some of the finest works of art from the Rubin Museum's collection while highlighting the stylistic diversity and relationships between different strands of Himalayan and neighboring cultural and artistic traditions. Masterworks will also highlight the museum's most notable recent acquisitions, all of which have rarely or

never been exhibited. Life-size facsimiles of an entire sequence of murals from the Lukhang, the Dalai Lamas' Secret Temple near the Potala Palace in Lhasa, Tibet, provide an exceptional opportunity for viewing Himalayan art at its most lavish. Their presentation at the Rubin marks the first showing in the world of prints created using this technology, and also provides the first ever opportunity outside Tibet to view life-size Tibetan murals in their relationship to portable art from the region.



The trip includes a docent-led tour through the **Museum**, located west of Union Square in Manhattan, and a group lunch in the Museum's Cafe, featuring foods of the Himalayas - a sample menu will be available at signup. The cost of the trip, including transportation, tour and lunch, is \$75. Our bus will leave promptly at 9:30 am, so leave time for parking (please park in the Library's rear parking lot). Payment with registration must be complete by Friday, March 25th, in order to finalize our luncheon plans. Refunds will be provided only if your space is filled. enjoy playtime together while building literacy and social skills.






